Right where we Are

It is sad to say, but the church world imitates the business world in many unhealthy ways. Churches try to sell themselves. They try to compete for market share. They try and steal from other churches for consumers of what they have to offer. I even know of a couple of small churches that were subject to an attempted hostile takeover by a mega-church seeking to add a site and expand its territory. While this may be successful in building human kingdoms, it does very little to build God's kingdom.

Sometimes we get discouraged as a congregation. We compare ourselves to a church down the road, or across the state, or across the country that has more people in attendance, more technological bells and whistles in worship, and have pastors that can pull off wearing skinny jeans that look like leggings and have enough hair that it requires hair-styling (sorry folks).

The truth is, smaller churches can be effective churches for the kingdom of God. We don't need to compare our congregation with the congregation down the road or across the country. We have a lot that we can uniquely offer people as a congregation of about 100 people. Study after study will show you that a congregation our size can have very effective ministry if we choose to embrace who we are, and be responsive to the opportunities for ministry that are set before us by the Holy Spirit.

Let me share a few ways smaller congregations, like ours, are uniquely equipped by God to do his work in their communities and the world:

- 1. Smaller churches can offer individual care and attention to each individual and family that walks through their doors in a way that larger churches can often miss or neglect.
- 2. Smaller churches, according to Outreach Magazine, are best equipped to bring more people to faith in Christ that larger congregations on a per capita basis
- 3. Smaller churches can allow individuals to be contributors in leadership, ministry, and service on a broader basis than larger churches can, helping people to grow as disciples in unique ways.
- 4. Smaller churches can be more intergenerationally bonded. Through intentionally building connections across ages, bonds can form that create a familial ethos. In is no accident that Paul used language of siblings for the people of God throughout the New Testament.

Now, in each of these examples, you read the phrase "smaller churches can...". This means what it says. These are opportunities smaller churches have, but not all small churches seize these opportunities. It is for this reason we need to focus on being a healthy church that grows in Christlikeness. By choosing to stay close to our missional calling, by striving to grow in our faith, and by being responsive to the leading of the Spirit we can be a healthy thriving church in the next decade. We can find our niche in North Platte, and set a new, healthy, faithful course for the next decade of our life together.

The Afternoon ABW hosted a Salad Luncheon on December 19th and sang Christmas carols. Music to our ears!


